Simultaneously, our infrastructure upgrades are gaining momentum. Road and stormwater repairs are underway across 12 wards, including critical work in Kroonvale, Umasizakhe, and Spandauville, alongside gravel road grading and water carting services. These efforts, detailed in our Public Works reports, directly address your feedback and prioritize safety, mobility, and service reliability.

This August, we honor Women's Month by celebrating the fearless women of 1956 who shaped our democracy. Their legacy challenges us to build a municipality where every woman is safe, respected, and empowered. I urge our community to participate in local dialogues, support women-led enterprises through our IGG grants and NYDA programmes and stand against gender-based violence. Together, let's advance economic inclusion and create opportunities that uplift women in every ward—because when women thrive, our whole community rises.

We also celebrated Mandela Month with profound purpose. Through the Handing-Over Ceremony, we equipped youth athletes and graduates with sports kits and training certificates, while our SPU Unit partnered with 10+ agencies to support residents with disabilities—honoring Madiba's legacy through tangible community action.

Crucially, our IGR Forum has cemented cross-departmental commitments to ward-specific development: road/water upgrades, youth skills programs, and agricultural support—all aligned with the District Development Model's 'One Plan' framework. # Dr. Beyers Naudé Municipality Commissions First Privately Funded Battery Energy Storage System

Dr. Beyers Naudé Municipality Commissions First Privately Funded Battery Energy Storage System Dr. Beyers Naudé Local Municipality has officially commissioned its first privately funded Battery Energy Storage System (BESS) — a landmark step in delivering sustainable, affordable electricity to residents.

Standing alongside the new installation, members of the Municipal Technical and Energy teams marked a historic milestone: for the first time, the municipality can actively participate in alternative electricity supply under the national Small-Scale Embedded Generation (SSEG) program, in full compliance with Schedule 2 of the Electricity Regulation Act. Through the UtCS My Munic Digital Energy Platform, the BESS will strategically store energy when prices are lower and discharge it when costs peak, reducing reliance on costly electricity purchases from Eskom.

This innovative deployment directly addresses long-standing, non-cost-reflective electricity tariffs that have challenged the municipality's financial sustainability. Beyond balancing Eskom account settlements, the grid-connected BESS unlocks an even greater achievement — the activation of the Council-approved Utility Bill Rebate Program. This initiative, enabled by improved electricity trading margins, will help make municipal electricity more affordable for residents. "This is only the beginning," said the municipality.

"In the coming months, we will roll out more grid-integrated, alternative supply projects — each strengthening our energy resilience and financial stability." Residents can look forward to regular updates, including clear guidance on how households will directly benefit. While the path ahead is technically complex, the goal is simple: a reformed municipal electricity model that delivers lasting value to every consumer. The journey to affordable electricity has begun.

## Roads & Stormwater Progress Dr. Beyers Naudé Local Municipality keeps infrastructure upgrades on track

The Dr. Beyers Naudé Local Municipality has released its Roads and Stormwater Report, highlighting significant progress in road maintenance, stormwater upgrades, gravel road grading, and water carting services across Graaff-Reinet, Aberdeen, and Nieu-Bethesda.

#### Pothole Patching Across Multiple Wards:

The Roads Team, supported by a tar crew focused on improving key streets:

Ward 2: Parliament & Caroline Streets (Horseshoe)

Ward 4: Gideon Scheepers, Kingwill, Pres Burger, Louis Trichardt, Louw Wepenaar & Piet Uys (Berg en Dal)

Wards 5 & 4: Republic Street (Kroonvale)

Ward 4: Meintjies & Kingwill Drive (Spandauville)

Ward 6: Jongani & Themba Streets (Umasizakhe)

Other key roads: Main Road, Queen Street, Somerset, Plasket Street, Alec Du Toit, Middle Street,

River Street, Woeke Street, Bresler Street

#### Stormwater and Sidewalk Repairs:

A dedicated stormwater and carpentry team carried out various upgrades, including:

Cleaning stormwater channels in Hope Street (Aberdeen, Wards 1 & 7)

Catchpit cleaning in Acasia Street (Kroonvale, Ward 5)

Replacement of broken or damaged slabs in Horseshoe and Industrial Area (Ward 2)

Sidewalk paving repairs in College Road (Spandauville, Ward 4)

Damaged paving repairs in Scholtz Street (Industrial Area, Ward 2)

Gate repairs at Community Hall (Umasizakhe, Ward 6)

#### Grading of Gravel Roads:

Extensive grading took place in Graaff-Reinet, Adendorp, Umasizakhe, Asherville, and Kroonvale, improving road access and safety for residents.

#### Water Carting Services:

To ensure continued water supply in areas facing shortages, water carting was carried out in Graaff-Reinet, Aberdeen, Jansenville, Klipplaat, and Nieu-Bethesda during the reporting period. Municipal spokesperson said, "We are committed to maintaining and improving our infrastructure to ensure better service delivery to all communities. These works form part of our ongoing programme to create safer, more accessible streets and reliable water services."







# Major Developments & Service Delivery Updates

Public Works Weekly Road & Stormwater Maintenance Update

The Dr. Beyers Naudé Municipality's Infrastructure Services – Public Works Section has announced this week's maintenance schedule.

#### Road Maintenance:

The pothole repair team will focus on key taxi routes, including Vink Street, Willie Deysel Street, Lang Street (Santaville), Republic Street, Jongani Street, and Woeke Street.

#### Stormwater Maintenance:

The stormwater team will be cleaning all water catchpits and manholes in the Bergen Dal area, with attention to Piet Uys, Hendrik Potgieter, Louw Wepenaar, Pres Burger, Gideon Scheepers, and surrounding streets.

## Owl House Craft Stalls Project Stalled for Three Years – Urgent Action Promised

On 18 July 2025, a meeting was held at the municipal auditorium with Deputy Minister Graham-Maré, representatives from the Owl House Board, and municipal councillors to address the long-standing issue of upgrading craft stalls outside the Owl House in Nieu-Bethesda. The Owl House, the town's leading tourist attraction, draws many visitors who also support local crafters.

However, current makeshift stalls—built by traders to withstand harsh weather—are in poor condition, prompting complaints from tourists and the community. In 2021, Council approved the construction of permanent trading structures, funded by a private investor, but progress has been stalled since 2022 due to a single appeal lodged against the project. Under SPLUMA regulations, an Appeals Committee must decide on the matter, yet no decision has been taken in three years. Board members expressed frustration, noting that designs are ready, funding is secured, and zoning changes have been approved—but bureaucratic delays are denying crafters a dignified workspace. The investor's funding also has a time limit. The Owl House Foundation also highlighted their ongoing support for crafters, including facilitating card payments for tourists and absorbing transaction costs. They warned that conditions must improve ahead of a planned November 2026 Helen Martins commemorative event to be attended by Minister Gayton McKenzie. The Foundation has given the municipality 14 days to respond. All parties agreed the matter requires urgent resolution.



### LAUNCH OF INTERGOVERNMENTAL RELATIONS





At the IGR & IDP Representative Forum held on 29 July 2025, government departments committed to targeted development across Dr. Beyers Naudé's 12 wards. Planned actions for 2025/2026 include road, water, and sanitation upgrades; expansion of early childhood development facilities; anti-poverty programmes; youth entrepreneurship and skills training; agricultural support; and sport. All interventions are aligned with the Eastern Cape's 2024–2030 IGR Strategy and the District Development Model, ensuring coordinated budgets and resources to close service delivery gaps. To drive results, the forum established strong accountability systems, including an IGR Clusters to track progress and quarterly reporting through the DDM's "One Plan" framework.. By uniting national, provincial, and local priorities with civil society and traditional leaders, the municipality is working to create inclusive, lasting change—ensuring that every ward benefits from shared growth and development.









# 67 Minutes for Mandela – Serving Our Community with DignityIn honour of Tata Nelson Mandela's birthday

Dr Beyers SPU Unit dedicated 67 minutes to uplifting some of the most vulnerable members of our community — people with disabilities. #### MUNICIPAL SUPPORT INTERVENTION





On 14 July 2025, the Department of Cooperative Governance and Traditional Affairs (COGTA) conducted a Municipal Support Intervention at Dr Beyers Naude Municipality. The intervention aimed to evaluate the municipality's performance in relation to the Key Performance Areas (KPAs) outlined in the Local Government: Municipal Systems Act, 2000 (Act 32 of 2000), and the implementation of the Putting People First Principles, Basic Service Delivery, Good Governance, Sound Financial Management and Building Capable Local Government and Local Economic Development and on 11th August all key areas were updated accordingly.

The visit formed part of COGTA's ongoing programme to strengthen governance, improve service delivery, and ensure compliance with statutory and policy frameworks.
